

"Confession and Absolution: God Wants You to Know You Are Forgiven!"

God wants you to know that you are forgiven. That's what Confession and Absolution is all about.

Forgiveness is at the heart of the Scriptures. He promised a Savior to Adam and Eve in the garden after they had fallen into sin. He forgave David's great and many sins. As Isaiah trembled before the Lord and the angels flew about crying out "Holy, Holy," the Lord through a burning coal touched Isaiah's lips and took away his guilt and atoned for his sin. Then the promised One came. He came preaching, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." He forgave the sins of adulterers, tax-collectors, and murderers. Then, all four Gospel climax with the death and resurrection of our Lord. Sin was forgiven. Death was defeated. Satan was overthrown.

But Jesus didn't stop there. He wanted to make sure we heard with our ears that we are forgiven for all our sin. So immediately on the evening of the resurrection He told His pastors this: "'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you.' And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld.'" He sent His pastors out into the world so that our ears can hear that we are forgiven.

We all know that food left in the kitchen does not do the family any good. Only when it is brought to the table and eaten by the family is it beneficial. The same is true for the forgiveness Jesus won for us on the cross. The forgiveness Jesus won for us so long ago does no one any good if it is left in the past. Only when that forgiveness is brought to our ears is it beneficial and nourishing. As one pastor writing for Higher Things aptly put it,

"Pastors are delivery men. More than anything this [is] our primary responsibility. Everything else is secondary. We are delivery men. It is our job to deliver to you God's gifts. We do that in different ways; but that is really what a pastor is to do. We preach God's Word and deliver the Law and the Gospel to you. We teach the Word in Bible study. We baptize people. We deliver Holy Communion to God's people. We pronounce Holy Absolution. God's gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation earned by Jesus are given out in the Word and the Sacraments in the Church. The pastor is the delivery man."

When we hear phrases like "private confession" or "individual absolution," these phrases can be scary sounding. They don't need to be. This is another wonderful way God brings you forgiveness. If you have sins that bother you, seemingly big sins or seemingly small sins, persistent sins, and sins that your struggle with, God has commanded your pastor to listen and forgive. Jesus said, "If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven." God wants you, dear sinner, to know that you are forgiven. He calls your pastor to make sure you hear it.

So I encourage you: if you are burdened by sins, go and talk with your pastor. Lay hold of the God's promise that when you hear him forgive your sins "this is just as valid and certain, even in heaven, as if Christ our dear Lord dealt with us Himself."

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF URGENT PLEA

After the severe earthquakes in Nepal that took the lives of so many people and destroyed homes and villages, Lutheran World Relief responded with quilts, personal care kits and water filtration systems. Now there is an urgent need to replenish and restock the warehouses. As the Kansas District plans for its annual LWR pick-up in October, these are items on which we might want to focus. Baby, school and fabric kits are also always needed.

When packing your items, please pack completed quilts or kits, like items together, in boxes (no plastic or paper bags), label the contents in LARGE BLOCK LETTERS on the outside of the boxes, and use strong cartons secured with packing tape. The total weight of each box is not to exceed 40 pounds.

Lutheran World Relief 2015 pick-up dates are: October 6 at St. Andrews, Wichita; October 7 at Trinity, Hays; October 8 at Trinity, Salina; and October 9 at Christ, Topeka. Trucks will be at each location from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Guidelines for assembling kits and making quilts are under the Caring Service tab on the LWML website, www.kansaslwml.org.

STAMPS FOR MISSIONS – THANK YOU!!


How many thousands of stamps go into a gallon ziplok bag? I haven't taken the time to count, but it's a large number, especially when they are correctly trimmed with a 1/4" margin around each stamp. Over the past year, churches and societies have collected and trimmed 36 gallon bags of cancelled stamps. The stamps go to the Texas District, where they will be sorted into various categories and sold to dealers. Those dealers in turn sell them to collectors, who purchase them for their stamp albums. All proceeds go to Lutheran World Relief to pay for quilt and kit shipping costs. When gathering stamps, please trim (with a scissors), leaving a ¼" margin. Also remember that the Liberty Bell stamp and stamps printed from a postage meter have no value. Keep collecting and trimming! How many gallon bags of stamps will we give to Texas in 2016?

2015 DES MOINES CONVENTION SUMMARY

Over 4,600 people attended the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) Convention in Des Moines, Iowa, June 25-28, 2015, under the theme "Bountiful! Sow –Nourish –Reap." The convention theme was based on the Scripture passage: *And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work* (2 Corinthians 9:8 NIV). LWML President Kay Kreklau, Drayton, North Dakota, welcomed participants saying, "We pray that God opens to us doors to sow and nourish the seeds of faith as we interact not only with the people of the LWML but also with the people He will place in our lives as we go out these doors, giving witness to our Triune God in what we say and in how we act."

Women, men, and children joined together on Thursday, June 25, 2015, and completed a variety of servant activities that included assembling Braille books of the Bible; writing cards of encouragement to cancer patients; packaging Meals for Kids Against Hunger; marking Bibles for Prison Ministry; making plastic bag mats, lap robes, fleece blankets, pillow case dresses, and quilts; and assembling Gospel bracelets. Boxes and boxes of Gifts from the Heart (material items given to Christian mission service organizations) were gathered for donations to Luther Care Services, Orphan Grain Train, and Lutherans for Life.

At the Thursday opening worship service, Rev. Gregory Seltz, speaker for the Lutheran Hour® radio program, challenged attendees to *Just be it!* – Children of God: restored, redeemed, and sent by Jesus. He emphasized, "You have been appointed, you have been anointed, and you have been sent in Jesus' name." A vocal choir of over 400 women, two bell choirs, and 20 instrumentalists contributed wonderful music. The live-streamed service was picked up in 25 countries and 49 states with thousands joining in real time to worship together.

Keynote speaker Rev. Dr. James Lamb, Executive Director of National Lutherans For Life, passionately invited all participants to, "Share, share the bountiful grace of God." Rev. Keith Piotter, pastor of Our Savior Lutheran Church in Bettendorf, Iowa, served as proclaimer for the Sunday closing worship service. Bible studies were led by former LWML Pastoral Counselor Rev. Michael Mattil, from Denison, Texas. Rev. Mattil said, "You sow the seed (God's Word) by pointing people to the cross and what it means for them. Once the seed is sown believers need to be nourished."

The convention featured a Mission Pledge Walk; an LWML Bountiful Bash Block Party; joyful singing under the direction of song leader Dr. Dina Vendetti, Dover, Delaware; and wonderful laughter provided by Jan Struck, Appleton, Wisconsin, who served as Humorous Interrupter. Presentations by Carly Hatcher, Executive Director of Mission Opportunities Short Term (MOST) Ministries; Rev. Jeffery Nehrt, from the LCMS Southern Illinois District Prison Ministry; Tim Hetzner, president of Lutheran Church Charities; and Rev. Dr. Tilahun Mekonnen Mendedo, president of Concordia College, Selma, Alabama, exhibited how God puts LWML mites into action. Gary Thies, Director of Mission Central, Mapleton, Iowa also inspired participants with his energy and dedication to God's mission.

The voting body elected Patti Ross, Tulsa, Oklahoma, as the new LWML President. Patti has served the LWML on all levels of the organization, most recently as Vice President of Christian Life from 2009-2013. President Ross encouraged the women of the LWML to embrace diversity as they are unified in faith. She will serve from 2015-2019. Recommended changes to the Bylaws, election of officers, and other business of the LWML intermingled with mission speakers, song, and laughter. For a lively finale to a busy day, Humorous Interrupter Jan Struck and Convention Song Leader Dr. Dina Vendetti took to the stage and provided the Saturday evening entertainment.

Offerings were gathered to benefit these organizations: Mission Goal for the 2015-2017 Biennium; Discovering Disabilities, Including ALL of God's Children Lutheran Special Education Ministries (LSEM) Farmington Hills, Michigan; Cabins for Christ's Children at Lutheran Valley Retreat, Colorado Springs, Colorado; Family of God Mission – Detroit, Michigan – A mission plant of the Michigan District that serves the addicted, homeless, and poor of South-West Detroit, Michigan. Preliminary totals for the offerings were shared with convention-goers and these totals continue to rise. 

This Summer

I have a busy and blessed summer ahead of me! My home congregation in Clay Center now has forty shut-in members, and I am going to visit them for about 20 hours per week. This will be a wonderful experience for me to grow in my pastoral care. I will occasionally preach a sermon and help with youth group, too. I also plan to lifeguard at our

brand new city pool (it was just built this spring). Growing up, I was on our summer swim team and lifeguarded, so this will be a return to the familiar. Finally, this summer I have the opportunity to go back to Israel again! From June 20 - July 20 I will be at Abel Beth Maacah participating in an archaeological dig (unless my sacroiliac joint doesn't heal quickly). Abel Beth Maacah, an important ancient Israelite city (2 Sam 20:14-22, 1 Kings 15:20), is in the far north of Israel near Lebanon and controlled several major trade routes. Archaeologists are currently excavating material from roughly the time of Joshua and Judges, approximately 3000 years ago. I'm excited to explore the history of the Bible in a more hands-on manner!

I leave for Westfield House and Cambridge in late August. I can't really describe how eager I am to study and learn in England!
