

My Mother's Ladies Aid and My Women in God's Service (WinGS)

Dear LWML Kansas District Sisters-in-Christ! Welcome Fall!



When I was growing up, Mother belonged to one of two LWML Societies in our church—the Bethany Guild, which was mostly "younger" women or women whose schedules worked best to meet in the evenings. After I married, I also joined this group of women for Bible study, service projects, fellowship, and prayer. I love(d) the women in the Bethany Guild!

After Mother ended working part-time outside of the home and preferred an afternoon meeting to an evening one, she switched her membership to the Ladies Aid Society. They have a nicely printed, very detailed annual

program book. They have a topic/Bible Study and a business meeting each month in the church basement. They always have a hostess and a dessert. Another Bible Study is led in the evening in the home of a Bethany Guild member. They have a very active sewing group which crafts hundreds of quilts for Orphan Grain Train. I love(d) the women in the Ladies Aid! And I love the women in our WinGS Group!

Fast forward to the Women in God's Service (WinGS) group to which I now belong. We meet monthly at 5:30 p.m. at the public library. It's "after work" for those who work outside of the home and finishes before any evening school, community, or sports activiites. Our "program book" is entirely digital and a little more "on the fly." The agenda is emailed, and we have dispensed with the typical meeting items such as roll call and reading of the minutes so there is more time for devotions, projects and fellowship. We rarely do business with a formal motion/second/discussion/vote but prefer to do business by an informal discussion and decision by consensus. We sometimes have fingerfood snacks, and sometimes, not. Two additional Bible studies are led during the week—one

in the afternoon, and another while the children are in FUSION (Midweek) classes. We have a group who crafts prayer shawls to give to those in need throughout the community.

These two groups are quite different, and yet, quite the same. Both have the common thread of being in The Word, serving others, and generously—faithfully—giving Mite Offerings that are sent in to support Mission Grants in the Kansas District and throughtout the world.

Is one type of group more "correct"? NO! Both groups meet the style of the women where they are in location, time, and season of life. And that, my dear Sisters-in-Christ, is what each of your local groups needs to find—the balance of Bible study, service, fellowship, and the opportunity to give Mite Offerings to support the "big-picture" purposes of Lutheran Women in Mission.

That is what makes LWML unique—there is NOT only one "right way" of meeting together. DO WHAT WORKS FOR YOUR GROUP! Be CREATIVE in trying new ideas. CONSIDER the new Mailbox Member program to reach more women! Be open to CHANGE! As we learned at the 2019 Kansas Assembly of Leaders, we are to "Follow the Leader." That Leader we follow is Jesus Christ. When we keep our eyes, our hearts, our minds, and our service focused on Him, the rest will fall into place.

Counselor's Corner

The Tour de France may be the most well-known bicycle race of our time. Bicyclists compete 23 days. This year they rode 2091 miles beginning in Brussels, Belgium, and traveled south in France, and then circled north to conclude in Paris. Egan Bernal, of Australia, became the youngest champion in decades, when he completed the race this year at age 22. Every day for three weeks, we are shown news video of the beautiful countryside as racers travel through much of France.

Joshua Robinson wrote a back story for the Tour de France in *The New York Times*, with a headline: "White paint keeps race rated G." (July 24, 2019) Their early morning responsibilities were to whitewash or camouflage obscene messages or political slurs that appear along the roadways and trails the bicyclists travel. They were to make sure the road service was fit for a global television audience. That meant no political messages, no rude words, and especially, no genitalia. They are known as the Tour's "Erasers", although whitewashers might be more appropriate. They wake up at the crack of dawn with a bucket of paint and some rollers.

One of the men explained, "You can't stop human stupidity," when he was asked about the reason why people draw obscene or political messages. The team can be quite creative, turning obscene drawings into something else, such as an owl or a butterfly, and at other times they simply paint giant white blocks in the road to cover over the offensive graffiti. The point of the article is that they must do it every single morning of the race. And the job is important every single year. It must be applied again and again.

There is something to learn from this. Human ingenuity, sinful ingenuity, always reveals itself. Sin is like that, in that it does not simply quit or go away. It is perverse, crude, and disgusting to others. The blood of Jesus covers us. And we need Him each day to make us presentable to the world, and to our heavenly Father.

Dear Bitsy, Our society is having trouble deciding the best time to meet. Our older members don't like to drive at night and the young women we'd like to invite work during the day. Any suggestions? Undecided

Dear Undecided, Your group is not alone in this quandary and I wish there was a pat answer. I can share what has worked with some other groups that I have visited and maybe it will spark an idea that will work with your unique group of Lutheran Women in Mission.

• Group One has several small groups within their big group. The small groups set their own meeting times and places; they may or may not serve refreshments. They try very hard not to meet for more than an hour at a time. They have small groups for Bible Study (one morning and one evening), sewing groups to make small Baptismal banners and large banners for church use, quilters, those who crochet plastic mats for the homeless, altar care, and service projects such as assembling Lutheran World Relief kits. Then once a quarter—February, May, September, and December—the large group meets for a fellowship meal and to share what everyone has been doing and to be sure they are meeting as many needs as they are able. This is when they "officially" collect mites, but mite donations can be made to the treasurer any time.

• Group Two meets on Saturdays and they alternate monthly meetings between Bible Study/ business and service projects/business. They also keep their meetings to an hour or less and they provide babysitting for any who might need it. They send out an agenda by email and/or snail mail at least a week before a meeting so everyone has a chance to prepare reports and get questions ready, because the business section of the get together is held to no more than 15 minutes. They don't serve refreshments, but do have snacks for the children.

• Group Three meets for monthly Bible Study/business during the day. They serve refreshments first during a 30 minute fellowship time. Four times a year they plan a meal and invite all the women of the congregation. They have some kind of planned program (a local hand bell choir, the police chief on personal safety, a local historian, the high school show choir, etc.) and they have information available about LWML in general and their group in particular. They always ask for suggestions on future programs and for ideas on service projects within the congregation. Their goal is to involve one new person in one activity per year.

It seems the groups with the most success stories are those who find out the interests of the women of their congregation and then look for ways to incorporate those interests into programs or service projects. These groups are willing to accept that it isn't necessary to have a business meeting every time they get together, but it is vital to begin with a devotion and/or prayer. They experiment, try new things, expect and accept some failures, but don't quit trying just because this time, this way it didn't work. God bless your efforts as you continue to Serve the Lord with Gladness! Bitsy

NEW Leader Development Fund Established for the Kansas District

The Executive Committee is pleased to announce the creation of a new Leader Development Fund for use in the Kansas District. The initial funds came from any "overages" held in the District Treasury following the 2016 and 2018 Conventions and from the 2017 Christian Life Retreat. (Being good stewards of registration fees for these events means the District operated in the black and had some money remaining after all expenses were paid.) NO Mite Offerings were used to fund the account. The purpose of the fund is to pay expenses toward developing Lutheran Women in Mission as leaders in the Kansas District. The first expenditure from the account was to pay the Zones \$150 toward the registration fees for their Zone Delegates to the Mobile Convention. At the Kansas Assembly of Leaders, each group/society was presented with the new "Mailbox Member" materials to use to reach out to all women in their congregations, and the cost of printing these notebooks was from the Leader Development Fund. 

More importantly, she is mentored on how to develop a strong relationship with God and others through her work in LWML.

Who may apply?

- 1. She must be a mature young woman between the age of 20-35, who is a member of the Kansas District Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.
- 2. She must be able to be away from home and/or work for the <u>entire</u> convention.

What can the YWR expect from the experience?

- 1. She will be given a "mountain-top" experience that will be spiritually uplifting, inspiring, fun-filled, and entertaining.
- 2. She will participate in worship services, the banner procession, a mentor lunch, and many special YWR activities. The days are busy and long!
- 3. She will be a special guest at the convention. Her LWML Zone will cover registration, travel, housing, and meal package costs.
